Pastors' Conference focus to be world missions 'Fruit'

NEW ORLEANS (BP) -- "Fruit That Remains" is the theme of the 1996 Pastors' Conference -- and more.

"Fruit That Remains" is integral to world missions, said Johnny Hunt, president of the annual conference preceding the Southern Baptist Convention.

"What really matters is not decisions, but disciples," said Hunt, pastor of First Baptist Church, Woodstock, Ga.

The June 9-10 Pastors' Conference will precede the SBC annual meeting June 11-13 in New Orleans' Superdome.

The "Fruit That Remains" theme, Hunt said, is based on John 15:16: "Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that ye should go and bring forth fruit, and that your fruit should remain: that whatsoever ye shall ask of the Father in my name, he may give it to you."

Among the greatest joys in his 10 years of ministry at the suburban Atlanta church, Hunt said, are people who made a decision for Christ in his first year "who have become some of the most productive in God's kingdom."

Their productivity, Hunt said, must be tapped for more than building a strong local church. "My passion for ministry is world evangelization," he said, explaining it has been "a progression in my life."

Earlier in his ministry, Hunt said, he was more focused on the church he was leading. "God has given me a broader perspective, which has enhanced our local ministry," he said. A strong church, however, exists "only for the expressed purpose of being effective in touching the world," he said. "It's just a means to God's ultimate plan -- and that is world evangelization."

One of Southern Baptists' greatest missions challenges, Hunt said, will come later this year, with the \$100 million goal for the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for foreign missions. SBC churches gave nearly \$90 million for the most recent offering and, until now, have never recorded an increase rivaling an added \$10 million, he said.

Hunt said he hopes the Pastors' Conference, which is like "the largest evangelism or missions conference" in the nation, will play an important role in meeting the goal. The conference will be "a time of refreshment and celebration" but also "a time of deeper commitment ... to be personally involved in bringing the world to Christ."

Schaller, Sweet headline WMU meeting in New Orleans

NEW ORLEANS (BP)--Addresses by Southern Baptist missions agency presidents and authors Lyle Schaller and Leonard Sweet, along with the election of a new national president, will highlight the June 9-10 Woman's Missionary Union annual meeting.

The yearly gathering of WMU leaders and members will be held at the New Orleans Marriott on Sunday and Monday prior to the Southern Baptist Convention annual meeting. Sessions begin at 2:30 p.m. Sunday afternoon and conclude Monday evening.

Larry Lewis, president of the Home Mission Board, will speak on Sunday afternoon. The session also will feature testimonies by home missionaries Herbert Martin of New Orleans and Carol Zimmerman of Baltimore and a recognition of other home missionaries attending the meeting.

The Sunday evening session will highlight Southern Baptist foreign missions. The evening will include testimonies by foreign missionaries Vivian Boyle from Tanzania and Susie Edworthy from Poland and a message by Foreign Mission Board President Jerry Rankin.

Schaller will deliver the keynote address Monday afternoon. The author of more than 40 books and 1,000 articles, Schaller is known as one of the nation's most influential church growth analysts and leader among American Protestants. He currently serves as research associate with the National Evangelistic Association.

Sweet, dean of theology at Drew University, Madison, N.J., will deliver the message during the closing session of the meeting. The founder of SpiritVenture Ministries, Sweet is the author of more than 100 articles and 11 books, including the best-seller "FaithQuakes."

The morning and afternoon sessions on Monday will highlight the work of WMU. The Monday morning session will include addresses by WMU Executive Director Dellanna O'Brien and WMU President Carolyn Miller.

In the afternoon, an address by Diana Garland, Gheens professor of Christian family ministry at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky., will help launch Project HELP: Child Advocacy, WMU's 1996-97 ministry project. Other activities during the session will be the introduction of the 1996 Acteens panelists and the election of national WMU officers for 1996-97.

Julie Rawls from Oklahoma City will lead the music during the two-day meeting. Soloist for the meeting will be Doris DeHaney from Pike Road, Ala. Special music presentations will be made on Monday evening by the Oklahoma Baptist Symphony and The Centurymen.

Church musicians' program keyed to praise & inspiration

NEW ORLEANS (BP)--A program of choirs and other musical groups, hymn singing and dramatic vignettes will be featured during the 1996 Southern Baptist Church Music Conference.

The conference, which is marking its 40th year, will meet June 9-10 at First Baptist Church, New Orleans, preceding the June 11-13 annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in the city's Superdome.

The 1,200-member conference is the only professional music organization for Southern Baptist musicians, said Bill Green, conference president and director of the church music department for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

"It brings together local church musicians, seminary and college music faculty and denominational workers in music across the convention," Green said.

Membership also includes a yearly journal, the Southern Baptist Church Music Journal, and a quarterly newsletter which touches on many facets of church music.

Long before becoming an officer in the conference, Green said, he valued his participation "because of the inspirational value the meeting has, because of being able to fellowship with church musicians across our convention and because music is such a strong focus in the life of Southern Baptist churches."

Each conference has offered a great diversity of musical styles and philosophies and an opportunity build meaningful relationships with fellow church musicians, Green added.

The theme for this year's conference will be "Come Together with Joy." Compared to previous years, there will be no keynote speaker, with Green explaining the evening worship services instead will be fashioned as "times of praise and inspiration through music," featuring musical presentations, hymns and drama, "all woven together to make these worship experiences significant in the lives of all who attend."

- -- 6:45 p.m. June 9: worship service and presentations of the choral anthem and hymn commissioned each year by the conference. The anthem, by Michael Cox, professor of music theology and composition at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, is titled, "Easter Morning." The hymn, by R.G. Huff, minister of music at University Heights Baptist Church, Colorado Springs, Colo., is titled, "Come, People of Our Lord." Performing the compositions, along with other music, will be the combined choirs of First Baptist Church, New Orleans; First Baptist Church, Kenner, La.; and First Baptist Church, Baton Rouge, La.

- -- 8:30 a.m. June 10: concerts by the Mississippi College Chamber Choir and Louisiana Baptist Children's Honor Choir; seminars on "Computers and Music," led by Bill Tiemann, minister of music, Buena Vista Baptist Church, Owensboro, Ky.; "Hymnology," Harry Eskew, professor of hymnology at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary; and "Change and Stress," Harles Cone, a management consultant from Liberty, Mo.; and small-group discussions led by Green; Gerald Ray, minister of music, First Baptist Church, Houston; Larry Black, minister of music, First Baptist Church, and J.M. Wood, retired minister of music, Broadmoor Baptist Church, both in Jackson, Miss.; and Bill Roper, minister of music, First Baptist Church, Montgomery, Ala.
- -- 1:30 p.m. June 10: second session for seminars; concert by Oklahoma Baptist University's Bison Glee Club.
- -- 7 p.m. June 10: worship service and concert by the adult choir and orchestra of First Baptist, Houston.

"I would encourage anyone to give consideration to coming to the conference," Green said, "and to plan to make this a part of their participation in years to come because of it relating so strongly to who we as Baptist musicians are." --30--

NEW ORLEANS (BP)--Gary Frost, second vice president of the Southern Baptist Convention, will be the guest speaker during the African American Fellowship's June 9 worship service preceding the June 11-13 SBC annual meeting in New Orleans.

The fellowship's Sunday worship will be at 5:15 p.m. at New Orleans' Franklin Avenue Baptist Church.

There are more than 1,600 African American congregations among the 40,000 churches in the SBC.

Frost, pastor of Rising Star Baptist Church, Youngstown, Ohio, played a key role in the SBC's adoption of a racial reconciliation resolution during the convention's sesquicentennial last June in Atlanta. Frost also is a member of the SBC Executive Committee.

The African American Fellowship's business meeting and luncheon will begin at 10 a.m. June 10 in the Court of Two Sisters, 613 Rue Royale, New Orleans.

The meeting will include a discussion of expanding the number of state-level fellowships across the country beyond about 25 now active. Awards from SBC agencies also will be presented in recognition of African American church achievements in church starting and church growth.

Hispanic meeting to include address by BWA's Nilson Fanini

NEW ORLEANS (BP)--Brazilian pastor Nilson Fanini, president of the Baptist World Alliance, will be among the featured speakers during the June 8 worship celebration of the Ninth Annual National Southern Baptist Hispanic Fellowship Conference.

The conference, to be conducted in Spanish in the chapel of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, is one of several meetings preceding the June 11-13 annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in the city's Superdome.

Hispanics account for 3,800 churches in the SBC, encompassing more than a half million members.

The worship celebration's theme will be "Agents of Missions, Instead of Objects of Missions."
