C. C. Warren Suffers Serious Heart Attack

CHARLOTTE, N. C.--(BP)--C. C. Warren, nationally-known Southern Baptist leader, suffered heart attack here and is in Charlotte's Memorial Hospital. Doctors said the attack was serious.

The director of the Southern Baptist Convention's movement to establish 30,000 new missions and churches, Warren has travelled constantly to all parts of the nation in church extension work.

In addition, he serves as permanent vice-chairman of the inter-convention Baptist Jubilee Advance committee. This committee co-ordinates the work of seven Baptist conventions in North America in their proclamation of the Baptist witness.

He was Convention president in 1956 and 1957.

Warren apparently must remain in the hospital for several weeks, followed by a longer period of recuperation at home before again undertaking personal direction of the 30,000 Movement.

Mrs. Warren reported that he wants to take care of urgent church extension business from his bedside but that doctors and family have forbidden it. No visitors outside the family may enter his hospital room at present.

Concerned about an important meeting in Atlanta and another in Nashville, Warren remarked to his wife, "Surely, he (the doctor) will let me get on my feet and go on over there for those meetings."

Before becoming director of the 30,000 Movement, Warren was pastor of First Baptist Church, Charlotte. It was his President's Address to the 1956 Southern Baptist Convention in Kansas City that launched the movement to double the new churches and missions by 1964.

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Travel Abroad And Get College Credit

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C.--(BP)--Wake Forest College here will offer a German class in Germany next summer.

Plans for the college's first class in a "study abroad" program were announced by Kenneth Keeton, assistant professor of German and originator of the project.

Keeton said up to 20 students, including summer transfers, will be allowed to enroll in the class which will spend approximately 10 weeks abroad. The class will leave New York the middle of June and will return in August.

"I know of no better way to understand a language and the culture it represents," Keeton said. "Also we think such a program has obvious advantages in broadening a student's general education."

The class will center its operations in Munich, spending two hours a day in instruction aboard ship on the way to Germany. After arrival, the students will be expected to speak only German.

Keeton said Munich currently is considered the cultural center of Germany. Attendance at a number of cultural events there will be required as part of the class work. The two-hour-a-day classes will be continued during the four weeks in Munich. A German student will live with the group in Munich and a number of German lecturers will speak to the class. The students also will tour a 75-mile radius of Munich by bicycle and bus.

From Munich a tentative schedule calls for touring Austria, Italy, Switzerland, France, and Holland.
