**Messengers To Learn  
SBC Resource Uses**

NASHVILLE (BP)--The use of total denominational resources by agencies is reported for the first time in the 1962 Book of Reports, prepared for messengers registering at the Southern Baptist Convention June 5-8.

These figures for 1962 show what the denomination spends on 66 programs, supported by operating budgets, and 24 projects, supported from capital funds. They were prepared by the SBC Executive Committee.

Most agencies have more than one program or project. The resources listed include those supported from Cooperative Program funds or, in the case of the Sunday School Board of the SBC, for example, from literature sales to churches and other revenue.

Two programs carried on by the Sunday School Board require more money than do any other programs carried on by an agency.

Book store operations heads the list of 66 programs, requiring \$9,072,587 during 1962, when the Sunday School Board, because of a change in its financial year, will have only nine months for its budget. On a 12-month basis, it would exceed \$12 million.

In second place is the Sunday School Board's publishing program, using \$8,824,118 during the short 1962 fiscal year and over \$11 million on a 12-month basis.

These and other Sunday School Board programs do not use Cooperative Program funds for their support.

Neither does the fourth ranking program, maintained by another SBC agency--Southern Baptist Hospitals. This agency is spending \$8,878,288 on patient care this year in its two institutions, at New Orleans and at Jacksonville, Fla.

The third-ranking program is that of foreign missionary support by the SBC Foreign Mission Board, costing \$8,963,519 during 1962.

The remainder of the 11 programs with \$1 million or more involved for 1962, the sponsoring agency and the amounts for 1962, are:

5. Retirement, Annuity Board, \$4-1/2 million, not from Cooperative Program.
6. Basic seminary degrees, by all the SBC seminaries, \$3,213,480.
7. Foreign evangelism, Foreign Mission Board, \$2,104,065.
8. Language groups ministries, Home Mission Board, \$1,814,557.
9. Schools operated on mission fields, Foreign Mission Board, \$1,533,856.
10. Associational and pioneer missions, Home Mission Board, \$1,459,207.
11. Assembly operations, Baptist Sunday School Board, \$1,266,692, no Cooperative Program funds.

Unless stated otherwise, the operating programs draw from the Cooperative Program, the SBC financial plan.

Five capital fund projects of various agencies exceed \$1 million in 1962. They are:

1. Evangelism and church development, Foreign Mission Board, \$2,716,833.
2. Stage I, expansion program, Southern Baptist Hospitals, \$2-1/4 million.
3. Missionaries' homes, Foreign Mission Board, \$1,653,880.
4. Church building loan funds, Home Mission Board, \$1,160,215.
5. Schools operated by Foreign Mission Board, \$1,153,175.

West Point Student  
Director Appointed

NEW YORK (BP)--Eugene Maston, graduate student at Columbia University, New York, has been chosen as the first Southern Baptist student director for New York City and United States Military Academy, West Point, N. Y. The position begins July 1.

His salary and expenses will be provided by the student department of Southern Baptist Convention Sunday School Board. His work will be under the supervision of the department of Training Union and student work of the Maryland Baptist State Mission Board, Baltimore, according to Sam A. High, secretary of the Maryland department of work, who announced the appointment.

Maston is the son of T. B. Maston, professor of Christian ethics at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Tex. The younger Maston is working on a doctorate in the philosophy of religion and plans to enter the teaching profession.

He is a graduate of Baylor University (Baptist) in Waco, Tex., has also done graduate work at Baylor and is a graduate of Southwestern Seminary with a bachelor of divinity degree.

He also earned the master of arts degree from the University of Chicago.

In his new post, Maston will be working with the largest aggregation of students in one city in the world. Half of his time is to be devoted to international students and half to American students in New York City and at the Army's Military Academy. He has been serving as volunteer Baptist Student director in New York for two years.

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William Jewell Calls  
Alumnus H. Guy Moore

LIBERTY, Mo. (BP)--H. Guy Moore, pastor for the past 15 years of Broadway Baptist Church, Fort Worth, has been elected president of William Jewell College (Baptist) here.

He succeeds Dr. Walter Pope Binns, who is retiring June 30 after 19 years as president. William Jewell is the senior Baptist college of Missouri.

The announcement of Moore's election was made by Charles F. Curry of Kansas City, president of the trustees, shortly after Moore read his resignation to his congregation in Fort Worth.

In his announcement, Curry said, "We feel extremely fortunate to have secured Dr. Guy Moore as the new president of William Jewell College to succeed Dr. Binns. Dr. Moore's long service as a Baptist pastor of large churches, his connection with the college as an alumnus and former trustee, his association with higher education through denominational organizations such as the Education Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, fit him to follow the distinguished career of Dr. Walter Pope Binns."

Moore is a native of DuQuoin, Ill. He will be 53 in July. He graduated from William Jewell in the class of 1931 after working his way through college, serving tables in the dining hall and doing other jobs on campus.

His professional training was completed at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, with the master of theology degree being awarded in 1933.

His honors include an honorary doctorate and a citation for achievement from William Jewell.

Broadway Baptist Church of Fort Worth has a membership above 5,000, a Sunday school enrolment of 2,820, and maintains an annual budget in excess of \$500,000. Prior to his service at Broadway, Moore was pastor for seven years of Wornall Road Baptist Church, Kansas City, Mo.

Moore was chairman of the Committee on World Evangelism of the Southern Baptist Convention. He is a member of the executive board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, and is a member of the special Christian education committee of the Texas convention.

These are included in the packets. So are special materials which are adapted to each year's changing Convention needs, for use as background.

We can mail only one packet to each paper at this time because of the tremendous postage bill for this bulky parcel, air mail. We realize its value to you, so we are happy to do this.

If your associate, as some have already indicated, wants a copy of the materials and he will assist you at San Francisco, he may obtain a packet at the Press Room there. However, we can not promise more than two packets to any paper--this advance one and one at the Press Room for you or for the associate. If, after meeting the needs of the secular press and the non-Baptist religious press, there are additional packets available, we will try to make these available.

Assembly day is scheduled for Friday, May 18. Packets will be mailed then or on Monday, May 21. They should reach you sometime the week of May 21.

The Convention Sermon advance has already reached you. The President's Address has been turned over to the printer. As soon as we have copies back, we shall send it your way, too, air mail.
