SOUTHERN BAPTISTS ATTENDING  
SUMMER MEETINGS IN EUROPE

NASHVILLE, Tenn. --(BP)-- Between eighty and 100 Baptist students from Europe and America will meet in mid-July at the Ruschlikon Seminary at Zurich, Switzerland, for a week of Bible study, inspiration and discussion. Four Southern Baptist students and several leaders will attend the meetings.

Promotion plans will also be discussed for the Fourth Baptist Youth World Conference to be held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in July 1953, according to Robert S. Denny, chairman of the Youth Committee of the Baptist World Alliance and an associate in the Student Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

Those attending the meeting from the South are Sam Hill, Jr., Kentucky; W. T. Lane, Kentucky; Fred Taylor, Tennessee; and Jack Carson, Texas, all students. Others will include Rev. and Mrs. Byron Wilkinson, pastor of the Grove Avenue Baptist Church, Richmond, Virginia; Dr. and Mrs. Ollie Edmunds, president of Stetson University, DeLand, Florida; Dr. Theodore Adams, First Baptist Church, Richmond, Virginia, and Denny.

Following this meeting, the group will visit Baptist work in Germany the week of July 22-29 and will travel to Copenhagen, July 29-August 3, for the first meeting of the European Baptist Federation.

The students representing Southern Baptists will be permitted to visit the sessions of the Executive Committee meetings of the Baptist World Alliance near Copenhagen, August 4-8. Southern Baptists attending the EWA meeting will include Dr. Adams, Dr. Edmunds, Dr. Duke K. McCall, Dr. J. D. Grey, Dr. C. Oscar Johnson, Mrs. George R. Martin, Dr. R. Paul Caudill and Dr. E. H. Pruden.

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HOWARD COLLEGE RECEIVES  
BEQUEST FROM MRS. INZER

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. --(BP)-- The late Mrs. Marie Smith Inzer, wife of Dr. John Inzer, beloved Alabama Baptist preacher, included Howard College in Birmingham in her will by leaving property in Sylacauga, Alabama, evaluated at the present at \$125,000.

The property, known as the Woolworth building in Sylacauga, will go to the possession of the college at the death of Dr. Inzer. She requested that the bequest be used to build a president's home for the college.

Mrs. Inzer died in May. She had been a victim of leukemia since 1947.

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
