**Viet Nam Veteran's Lost  
Bible Found for Wedding**

KY HA, Viet Nam (BP)--A Bible lost in Viet Nam by a Marine found its way to Birmingham, Ala., just in time for one of the happiest moments in the Marine's life.

Cpl. Ted Barnett, a Southern Baptist, was wounded in combat near here and was evacuated to a field hospital. It was then that he discovered the loss of his Bible, a gift from his fiancée about a year earlier.

Barnett had carried the Bible throughout his tour of Viet Nam, and he treasured it. He sent a friend back to look for the Bible, but to no avail. Finally Barnett was transferred back to the United States with little hope of seeing his Bible again.

Then the Bible turned up. A crew chief on a helicopter found Barnett's Bible in his chopper.

Not knowing what to do with it, he gave the Bible to Chaplain Marvin W. Howard, a Southern Baptist chaplain for Marine Aircraft Group number 36.

Chaplain Howard found a newspaper clipping in the Bible with an advertisement for Fullilove's Body and Fender Shop in Birmingham, Ala., so he sent it to Mr. C. H. Fullilove in Birmingham, hoping that he might know the owner.

Arriving in Birmingham three days before Barnett's wedding, the battered Bible was covered in white satin and lace and was carried by his bride during the wedding ceremony.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Barnett, the former Sheryl Standridge, are members of the Center Point Baptist Church in Birmingham, Ala.

The battered Bible that found its way across the ocean with the help of a Baptist Chaplain in Viet Nam is one keepsake they will probably treasure for a lifetime.

HONOLULU, Hawaii (BP)--Honolulu Police Chief Dan S. C. Liu, an active Southern Baptist layman, has been named the first recipient of the J. Edgar Hoover Gold Medal Award for outstanding law enforcement work.

Sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, the award consists of a medal, a citation, plus a \$1,000 grant to defray the expenses of sending a law enforcement officer designated by the winner to the FBC Police Training Academy.

In receiving the award, Liu said he "would like to accept it as a tribute to all law enforcement officers in the nation."

Liu plans to be in New York for the VFW national convention (Aug. 22) to accept the award personally.

He currently is attending a seminar on law enforcement administration at Harvard University as one of 40 police chiefs throughout the nation selected to participate.

As a law enforcement officer, he is internationally known. He has served as president of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, and also as president of the 63rd session of the FBI National Academy in Washington.

A Sunday School teacher at the Olivet Baptist Church, he is also widely known as an outstanding Christian leader.

When an article stating his Christian philosophy appeared in a well-circulated magazine, he received numerous letters from other law enforcement officers indicating that they too would take a stand for Christianity.

"I'm not a religious fanatic," Chief Liu was quoted in an article in the August issue of Home Missions magazine. "I just believe that a person with . . . religious convictions has to be a practical Christian."

Applying his practical faith, Chief Liu has been instrumental in cleaning up gambling, prostitution, and other social malignancies in Honolulu, according to Home Missions magazine, a publication of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board.

The police chief is also devoted to youth work in Boy Scouts, YMCA, Youth for Christ, and the Police Activities League which sponsors baseball and other activities for juveniles who have been in trouble with the law.

In 1965, Chief Liu was voted the most admired man in the state of Hawaii. Also in 1965, he delivered a major address at the Baptist World Alliance meeting in Miami Beach, Fla., on "A Christian Layman as a World Citizen."

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Baylor Now Offers  
Ph. D. In Religion

WACO, Tex. (BP)--Baylor University, largest Baptist school in the nation, this fall will institute a plan of study leading to the doctor of philosophy degree in religion.

The Ph. D. program was approved by the Baylor trustees last spring. Through research-minded pastors will be welcomed, it will be aimed at preparing teachers of religion for the nation's colleges and universities.

Ray Summers, chairman of the Baylor religion department and the program's architect, said that he expects about 15 students for the first semester.

Admission to the Ph. D. program of study requires a bachelor's degree with grades sufficient to meet Baylor Graduate School requirements, adequate performance on graduate record examination aptitude tests, reading knowledge of at least two modern foreign languages, normally French and German, and a working knowledge of Hebrew and Greek.

In addition to these, a student must pass qualifying examinations before admission to doctoral study. These examinations consist of nine two-hour tests in Old Testament, New Testament, Biblical theology, historical theology, systematic theology, Christian ethics, psychology of religion, history of Christianity, and comparative religion.

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Brooks Named Division  
Head For North Carolina

RALEIGH, N. C. (BP)--Nathan C. Brooks Jr. of Louisville, Ky., has been named director of the division of church programs for the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina with offices here.

Brooks, pastor of Highland Baptist Church in Louisville, will assume the position Sept. 1. He was elected by the executive committee of the North Carolina convention General Board.

A former president of Carver School of Missions and Social Work in Louisville for four years before the school's merger with Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Brooks will be the first man to hold the position with the North Carolina convention.

The convention authorized the division in 1959 under reorganization of convention work. Brooks will have administrative responsibilities over the convention's departments of Sunday School, Training Union, church music, Brotherhood, student work, church building planning, the North Carolina assembly, survey and statistics, and all church program projects.

A native of North Carolina, Brooks is a graduate of Mars Hill College (Baptist), Mars Hill, N. C.; Wake Forest College (Baptist) now in Winston Salem, N. C.; and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville. He has done continuous graduate work at Columbia University and Union Theological Seminary, New York nearly every summer.

He is a former Training Union department secretary for North Carolina Baptists and was also acting state student department secretary, beginning his ministry as assistant pastor of Broadway Baptist Church, Knoxville, Tenn., in 1934, and later serving as pastor in Bryson City, N. C.

Brooks has also served as pastor of First Baptist Church, Waynesboro, Ga.; Earle Street Baptist Church, Greenville, S. C.; Emmanuel Baptist Church, Alexandria, La.; and First Baptist Church, Pensacola, Fla.

Mrs. Brooks has a professional social work degree from Kent School of the University of Louisville, and is currently working with the Family and Children's Agency in Louisville. Their eldest son, Nathan III, is associate minister of Montgomery Hills Baptist Church, Silver Spring, Md., and two other sons are students at North Carolina Baptist colleges. They also have two daughters.
