UTAH BAPTISTS PLAN  
FIFTH ANNUAL CAMP

ROOSEVELT, Utah --(BP)-- More than 300 Southern Baptists in Utah are expected to gather at Uintah Canyon July 28 to August 2 for their fifth annual encampment, according to George M. Williams, president of the camp and pastor of the First Baptist Church of Provo.

The camp has grown from an enrolment of sixty its first year (1948) to a registration of over 200 last year. During the services of the four week-long camps, ninety-six professions of faith have been made.

Ira I. Marks, general missionary under the Arizona convention and the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board, is in charge of the study work planned for the camp. Other activities will include morning watch, worship services, supervised recreation and campfire vesper services.
