**New York Area Baptists Take
Convention Formation Steps**

ENDICOTT, N. Y. (BP)--Baptists from New York, New Jersey, and lower Connecticut took steps here toward creating a Baptist state convention in 1970, adopting a constitution for a new Baptist Fellowship of New York.

The Fellowship will function, in effect, as a state convention until the convention is officially organized in the fall of 1969. On Jan. 1, 1970, the name would be changed to the Baptist Convention of New York.

A committee of four men each from four associational areas in the three states submitted the constitution for the Baptist Fellowship of New York, and reaffirmed the target date of Jan. 1, 1970, for the new state convention to become operational.

About 200 Baptists from New York, New Jersey and lower Connecticut attended the historic session here, and voted to hold a second meeting Sept. 27-28 at the First Baptist Church in Brooklyn, N. Y.

A \$5,450,000 budget for operation of the new Fellowship was approved, with 20 per cent of all receipts allocated to the Southern Baptist Convention for world missions.

The three associations in the group which now are affiliated with the Maryland Baptist Convention each pledged definite dollar amounts to the budget, and the Frontier Baptist Association, affiliated with the Ohio Baptist Convention, has asked its churches to send 40 per cent of their Cooperative Program unified budget receipts to the new Fellowship, and 60 per cent to the Ohio convention offices.

The new Fellowship is comprised of four Baptist associations in New York, New Jersey and lower Connecticut--the Adirondack Baptist Association, the Central Baptist Association and the Metropolitan Baptist Association (all affiliated with the Maryland convention), and the Frontier Association.

The meeting here was the first session of the area Baptists since a meeting in September of 1967 when the Northeastern Regional Baptist Fellowship voted to split into two groups and explore the possibility of forming two fellowships or conventions, one including the three states in this fellowship, and another including New England area Baptists.

Elected the first president of the Baptist Fellowship of New York was David Morgan, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Brooklyn, N. Y. Morgan had issued the call inviting all Baptists from the three-state area to form the fellowship. Thirteen members of an executive board were also elected by the fellowship.

**Reconsideration Of Federal
Aid Declined by Atlantans**

ATLANTA (BP)--An effort to get the Atlanta Baptist Association to call another special session to reconsider its earlier approval of federal funds for the Atlanta Baptist College here has been ruled out of order by the association's executive committee.

The committee agreed that "a motion to reconsider must be made by the one voting with the majority," according to Roberts Rules of Order.

Action on the matter turned down a plea from W. I. Warren, pastor of Venetian Hills Baptist Church here asking for a called associational meeting to rescind the federal aid action of January, and to allow messengers to vote on releasing the college from the association.

"No emergency exists such as required under Article VI of our constitution to call a special meeting of our association," said the executive committee ruling.

Nevada Baptist Fellowship
Urges State Prison Chaplain

LAS VEGAS, Nevada (BP)--Meeting for its third annual session, the Nevada Baptist Fellowship urged the Nevada legislature to provide a chaplain for the state prison at Carson City, Nevada, and authorized a committee to draft a constitution for the fellowship.

Although the fellowship set no target date for establishing a Baptist state convention in Nevada, the drafting of a constitution and bylaws is one step in that direction.

Nevada Baptist leaders said that the convention will not be organized until a minimum of 70 churches with 10,000 members, or 50 churches with 12,000 members is reached. The fellowship is currently comprised of 34 churches and 9 missions, with 5,968 members.

Presently, Southern Baptists in Nevada are affiliated with the Southern Baptist General Convention of California, and (in the southern part of Nevada) with the Arizona Southern Baptist Convention.

The meeting here was the first time in the three-year history of the fellowship that the Nevada Baptist churches had elected messengers with authority to vote and conduct business.

Major action was the authorization of the committee to draft a constitution and/or bylaws, and the resolution urging the governor and state legislature in Nevada to provide a chaplain for the state prison in Carson City, Nevada.

The resolution noted that the legislature allocates \$5,500 to pay a \$25 per diem to Carson City area ministers who are called upon to lead brief prayers at the sessions of both houses of the legislature, and the resolution suggested that this \$5,500 could better be used in providing a chaplain in the state prison system.

Elected president of the fellowship was Harold B. Griffin, pastor of the College Park Baptist Church in Las Vegas.

Principal speakers for the meeting included A. B. Rutledge, executive secretary of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board; James L. Sullivan, executive secretary of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board; and several other leaders from the Home Mission Board and California and Arizona conventions.

Messengers to the fellowship meeting voted to hold their 1969 session at the Temple Baptist Church, Sparks, Nevada.

Missions Giving For First
Quarter Nears \$20 Million

NASHVILLE (BP)--Total missions contributions to Southern Baptist Convention causes for the first quarter of 1968 neared the \$20 million mark, the SBC Executive Committee reported here.

The \$19,920,856 in missions contributions to the SBC included \$13.3 million to specific, designated Southern Baptist mission efforts; and \$6½ million through the SBC Cooperative Program unified budget plan that finances 20 SBC agencies.

During the first quarter of 1968, Cooperative Program missions gifts increased \$231,778 or 3.64 per cent over similar contributions for 1967; and designated gifts increased \$385,706 or 2.98 per cent for the same period in 1967.

The report for the quarter also included a summary of contributions for the month of March, when Southern Baptists gave \$2.1 million through the Cooperative Program, and \$3.2 million to designated causes, for a total of \$5.3 million during the month.

BSU¹ Study Committee
Appointed, Sets Meeting

NORTH LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (BP)--A 27-member committee to make a detailed study of Southern Baptists' work with college students has been appointed here, and the first meeting of the group has been slated in Nashville on May 16-17.

The committee was appointed by Rheubin L. South, pastor of Park View Baptist Church in North Little Rock, and chairman of the program subcommittee of the Southern Baptist Executive Committee.

Named chairman of the 27-member committee was Lamar Jackson, pastor of the Southside Baptist Church, Birmingham, Ala.

The committee was appointed at the request of the SBC Executive Committee, acting on a request by the SBC Sunday School Board and the state student directors working with the Baptist Student Union.

The committee will be asked to study both the program of student work (the Baptist Student Union), and the placement of the student work program in the convention's organizational structure.

South said in announcing the committee members and the first meeting that the committee had no time-table for completing the depth study, but that a plan for conducting the study had been broadly outlined.

He added that the committee was composed of a broad cross-section of Southern Baptists, and that there was no attempt in appointing the members to select persons who would be in agreement with each other, but rather there was an attempt to get differing viewpoints.

The committee is comprised of eight members of the SBC Executive Committee, five Baptist state convention executive secretaries, six student directors for state conventions, five directors of campus Baptist Student Union programs, and two at-large members, including one editor and one college professor.

The first meeting will feature several panel discussions on such topics as a profile of the college student of 1968, how student work has changed in the last decade, and the church and college youth, plus general discussion on the basic problems that committee members feel the study will help resolve.

South said that the plan approved by the program committee for the study procedure includes interviews with Baptist leaders involved in study work and students, a national consultation on the Baptist student, integrative review of all materials for study, and surveys.

One or two seminary faculty members would be employed in the summer to conduct interviews of state executive secretaries, state student directors, campus BSU directors, faculty advisors, groups of pastors and groups of students. An estimated 60 days of interviews would be held.

The proposed national consultation on the Baptist student would probably be held in May of 1969. The study committee would not prepare its report until after findings have been determined on previous aspects of the study.
