HEART ATTACK CLAIMS LIFE OF M. E. DODD

SHREVEPORT, La. -- (BP) -- Dr. M. E. Dodd died in Long Beach, California, August 6, following two heart attacks that day. He was 73 years old.

Funeral services were conducted in Shreveport where he had lived since 1912 when he became pastor of the First Baptist Church. He retired from the active pastorate in August 1950.

Dr. Dodd was a graduate of Union University, Jackson, Tennessee, and held honorary degrees from Union and Baylor universities. He was president of Dodd College in Shreveport during its existence.

Ordained to the ministry in 1902, he served pastorates at Fulton, Paducah, and Louisville, Kentucky. He was past president of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and of the Southern Baptist Convention. He was a member of the executive committee of the Baptist World Alliance.

During his thirty-eight years as pastor at Shreveport, over 13,000 were added to the church, fifteen new churches grew out from the First Church and a gigantic educational building program was completed. Dr. Dodd also wrote ten books and more than forty tracts and other booklets during his ministry.

The hospital was constituted in 1912 with a 100-bed capacity and now has a 500-bed capacity. With the erection of a new thirteen-story addition for which plans are now near completion, the capacity will be increased to 750. Frank S. Groner, administrator of the hospital, predicts that more than 25,000 patients will be cared for in the hospital this year. Celebration features included outstanding guests both in the Southern Baptist Convention and in hospital administration. A thanksgiving service at Bellevue Baptist Church Sunday, July 20, with Dr. Robert G. The story of a young girl and her sister who desire to become Christians and to join the church, but are prevented from doing so by worldly-wide parents, the film production is scheduled to begin early in 1953.

Hammon is also author of the original story from which the Broadman film, "Bible on the Table," was made and released in June, 1951. This film has just been given the Christian Youth Cinema Corporation 1951 award as the most outstanding religious motion picture on family worship.

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R. KELLY WHITE IS PRESIDENT OF BELLIONT COLLEGE, NASHVILLE

MASHVILLE, Tenn. -- (BP)-- Dr. R. Kelly White, pastor, First Baptist Church, West Palm Beach, Florida, has been elected president of Belmont College, Nashville, one of three major Tennessee Baptist schools. He is expected to take office October 1.

A native of North Carolina, Dr. White is a graduate of Wake Forest College and Southern Baptist Seminary, Louisville. He became pastor of the Belmont Heights Baptist Church in Nashville in 1928, remaining until 1946 when he accepted the West Palm Beach pastorate.
