Carver Trustees Make Five Title Changes

LOUISVILLE--(BP)--Five faculty and staff members of Carver School of Missions and Social Work here have received new titles, carrying with them changes in responsibility.

The action was taken by the school's trustees, following recommendations of a Chicago management consultant firm, Booz, Allen, and Hamilton.

Also at the recommendation of Booz, Allen, and Hamilton, the trustees increased the salaries of each of the five professors and also raised salaries of several staff members.

Amounts of salary increases were not reported.

Those assigned new titles were:

George A. Carver, professor of missions, who was named dean of the faculty. He will retain his teaching role.

Hugh A. Brimm, who in addition to serving as professor of anthropology and human relations, will be director of public relations.

Mrs. B. F. Loyd of the secretarial staff, who was appointed acting registrar.

Mrs. John Sible, who has been bookkeeper. She was given the title of financial secretary.

Miss Norma Jean Baker, who has been serving as a student counselor and in public relations contacts for Carver School. Miss Baker was appointed administrative assistant.

Trustees authorized the administration and faculty to begin plans for a professional publication in the fields of missions and church social work. Definite dates for the new periodical to be published will be set later.

President Nathan C. Brooks was authorized to negotiate for accreditation of Carver School with the Council on Social Work Education. Recognition by this council will give Carver School professional standing in the field of social work. The school already is working toward accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Carver School of Missions and Social Work is an institution of the Southern Baptist Convention.

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Southwestern Seminary Republishes Journal

FORT WORTH--(BP)--Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary here will start republication of its semi-annual "Southwestern Journal of Theology." The first issue of the new series will be published in October.

Four of the six major articles in the forthcoming issue will deal with the Gospel of Mark, and are designed to help pastors prepare for the Southern Baptist Conventionwide Bible study week in January.

Mark's Gospel is subject of the Bible study week.

The four articles are "Mark's Gospel in Source- and Form-Criticism" by V. E. Gideon; "An Exegetical Approach to the Eschatology of Mark" by Ray Summers; "The Christ of Mark's Gospel" by Jesse J. Northcutt, and "Preaching Values in Mark's Gospel" by H. C. Brown Jr. Each of the authors is a member of the seminary faculty.

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Other articles in the October number, also written by seminary professors, are "The Revival of 1858" by C. E. Autrey and "Constructive Christian Tension" by T. B. Maston.

The "Southwestern Journal" has not been published for a number of years. James Leo Garrett of the seminary faculty is managing editor of the revived publication.

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English-Speaking Church Sends Gift

WIESBADEN, Germany--(BP)--The new English-speaking Immanuel Baptist Church here has sent \$100 to the treasury of the Southern Baptist Convention in Nashville, Tenn., for Cooperative Program distribution.

The Wiesbaden church is the oldest of two English-speaking Baptist churches established in this area of West Germany. The local church was organized in April, 1957.

Both it and the English-speaking Frankfurt church have found German Baptists in the two cities invaluable in helping them organize.

The English-speaking churches minister chiefly to the large number of American military and civilian personnel and their families attached to United States military bases.

Herman Dee Stout, pastor of Immanuel Church here, said in a letter to Porter Routh, Southern Baptist Convention treasurer:

"We thank God for the wonderful way in which he is blessing our church financially. We have voted to send 10 per cent of our total income through the Cooperative Program beginning with the August, 1958, receipts.

"We trust that our offerings will increase, and it will be possible for us to increase the percentage also."

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Convention Housing Bureau Opens Dec. 1

LOUISVILLE--(BP)--A housing bureau to receive requests for reservations in hotels, motels, and private homes during the 1959 Southern Baptist Convention here will be opened on Dec. 1.

James C. Austin, secretary of the local general arrangements committee, said that official application forms will be placed in Baptist state papers and in the magazine, Baptist Program, in November.

The housing bureau, he said, will not accept any applications except those made on official forms. No application will be honored if it is postmarked before Dec. 1.

A deposit of \$10 is required for each room reserved.
